J. Franklin Styer, Former Council Member, Dies Helped Create the PHS Gold Medal Plant Awards.

J. Franklin Styer, 95, former owner of J. Franklin Styer Nurseries in Concordville, died on January 1 at his home in Bend, Oregon.

In addition to being a distinguished member of the horticultural community for many years, Frank was a member of the PHS Council from 1953 to 1965.

In the late '70s, Styer approached the Society with a suggestion that we initiate an award to stimulate the use of a broader variety of quality plants in the landscape.

Originally called the J. Franklin Styer Award of Garden Merit, this is now our Gold Medal Plant Award Program.

Thanks to Frank's generosity, the administrative expenses of the program are partially underwritten.

Since the awards were first made in 1988, we have, with the help of a dedicated team of evaluators, recognized 50 plants and the program is really catching on. In early January, for example, Dora Galitzki, correspondent, New York Times, mentioned the 1996 award winners in her column and within a few days our mailbag was full of requests for information from across the country.

The Junior Flower Show turns 21 this year in its new home: Memorial Hall in Fairmount Park.

Show dates are June 5 through 6, in conjunction with the two-week-long Philadelphia County Fair. The partnership with the County Fair and the move to Memorial Hall means that many more people will be able to view the exhibits

of the region's budding horticulturists.

The Show's theme, *Philadelphia In Flower*, emulates the theme of the 1996 Philadelphia Flower Show. In addition to entering any number of horticultural classes, school-age exhibitors will be able to flex their creative muscle in artistic classes that focus on some of Philadelphia's unique attractions:

May 5: Main Line from Gulph Mills to Merion

These seven gardens range from a small, well-designed garden on less than a half acre to a 40-acre estate, home to thousands of azaleas. The styles of the gardens vary as well: visitors will see a backyard woodland and a terraced garden where the texture of unusual conifers provides a key element in a hillside garden. A new home and garden on the site of a former estate has simplicity and minimalism governing the design and choice of plants.
